## The Company You Keep

1 CORINTHIANS 15:33 NASB - (33) Do not be deceived: "Bad company corrupts good morals."

It is better to be alone, than in the wrong company. (Then again, if we have a relationship with God, we are not alone). Tell God who your best friends are, and He will show you who you are. If we run with wolves, we will learn how to howl, but, if we associate with Eagles, we will learn how to soar to great heights. A mirror reflects a person's face, but who we really are is shown by the kind of friends we choose. A simple but true fact of life is that we become like those with whom we closely associate with for the good and the bad. Any time we tolerate mediocrity in others, it increases our mediocrity. An important attribute in successful people is their impatience with negative people.

As we grow, our associates will change. Some of our friends will not want us to advance. They will want us to continue being dormant with them.
